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PM's Regional leadership engagement successful

As part of ongoing efforts of government aimed at appreciating and monitoring the implementation of government development programmes, Prime Minister Dr. Saara Kuugongelwa-Amadhila visited all 14 Regions in Namibia meeting Regional leadership from 14 October to 14 November 2022. During the meetings the Prime Minister was updated on progress of government development projects and challenges impacting development in the regions. The meetings were mainly attended by various Traditional Authorities, Village Councilors and government officials.

Some of the recurrent issues that kept resurfacing include matters relating to water provision, land, drought relief, education, resettlement, decentralization, health care, Performance Management System (PMS), youth empowerment, industrialization, land bill, food security, ancestral land bill, and resettlement.

She used the opportunity to, *inter-alia*, provide feedback on important policy matters from central government such as new developments on genocide, revenue collection and savings through efficiency, Business Rescue Task Force, the envisaged Constituency Development Fund and the importance of mobilizing the savings held by pension funds, banks and insurance companies to fund strategic national development projects, through the framework of Public Private Partnerships (PPP) Act of 2017. "The Public Private Partnership Act (PPP Act) provides a framework for public and private entities to co-invest in strategic national initiatives, thereby enhancing public service delivery and accelerating development," she said.

Other feedback, she provided relates to Green Hydrogen and feedback on the implementation of the recommendation of the Land Conference on access to land, Public Service Employee Medical Aid Scheme (PSEMAS) reforms and plans to improve public health

facilities. "This would lead to increased use of these facilities by the public and the PSEMAS members. This will reduce the cost of PSEMAS towards private hospitals," she emphasized.

The Prime Minister further encouraged the leaders to strengthen the systems to prevent and operationalize the laws to instil a culture of zero tolerance for corruption, cascade performance agreements in a way that people understand and engage easily, coordinate among and between each other, innovate and generate results through efficiency gains.

Cognizant of high employment rate in the country, she encouraged the Regional leadership to prioritize the use of local youth artisans, in order to create employment by assisting them through procurement to sustain their businesses. "We should only use foreign services when we do not have the capacity to produce local products and source locally, let's engage continually with each other," says the PM.

The Prime Minister further encouraged the regional leadership to leverage and harness the benefits of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) benefits.

The Prime Minister visited the Neckartal Dam and a private owned irrigation scheme outside in the Hardap region. She said the project is evidence of what Namibia can achieve as a country, adding that it shows the potential that exist for Namibia to diversify its economic activities, build resilience by reducing our dependency on imports and to optimize job creation.

Finally the Premier urged regional leadership, to have regular exchanges among themselves, share working ideas, put their political differences aside, pull together in the spirit of Harambee and focus on serving the public.



PM hails the State Parties Assessment Tool (SPAT)

Prime Minister (PM) Dr. Saara Kuugongelwa-Amadhila, consultants from the African Union Commission (AUC) and participants from the various Offices, Ministries and Offices (OMAs) in Namibia met at the State Parties Assessment Tool Pilot Program Conference from 26 to 29 September 2022, at Seaside Hotel & Spar, Swakopmund, Erongo region.

The main objective of the Pilot Program was to provide participants (various OMAs) with an in-depth appreciation and understanding of the African Charter, the Reporting Guidelines and the State Parties Assessment Tool as a mechanism for effective reporting to the AUC on the implementation of the Charter.

The PM in her speech said the Namibian Government “is committed to transform the public sector, in order for it to respond effectively to the public service demands of the citizens. To this end, government is championing innovation in the public sector as a vehicle to promote the building of human and institutional capacity for public policy analysis, policy design and

implementation, and public administration and management.” Furthermore, the African Charter on Values and Principles of Public Service and Administration aims to ensure that government promotes the values and principles governing the organization of Public Service and Administration. The Charter aims to promote professionalism, innovation and cooperation with other Governments, to continuously improve public service.

The Prime Minister said; “I am pleased to note that, since 1997, Namibia has been one of the pioneers in championing the African Charter principles and values to harmonize the services of the public sector. We shall continue with reforms to ensure efficiency and effective public service delivery.”

Finally, the PM urged further collaboration between Namibia and AUC on capacity building for the effective implementation of the Charters to achieve the desired results.

Sennen Mukulu 'restores her dignity'

Restore Her Dignity is an initiative that collected 1900 packs of Sanitary Pads from good Samaritans across Namibia over 10 months. On 6 August 2022, these Sanitary Pads were distributed to 190 girls from 30 schools in Windhoek, with each girl receiving 10 packs of Sanitary Pads.

Restore Her Dignity is founded by Sennen Mukulu, a male Human Resource Practitioner at the Office of the Prime Minister, Republic of Namibia.

Mukulu says, "Restore Her Dignity project strives to equalize the socio-economic status of all Namibian girls, by ensuring that no girl faces the dilemma of choosing between education and staying at home during her menstrual cycle."

Unaware of how impactful his birthday wish in October 2021 would be, Mukulu posted a status on his WhatsApp requesting that his family, friends, and associates who intend to gift him, instead turn their planned gifts into Sanitary Pads for needy girls.

In a society where the socio-economic status of young girls and women remains a developmental challenge, Mukulu's birthday wish went viral as it challenged common beliefs and accordingly triggered much curiosity from his audience.

Furthermore, Mukulu emphasized that his desire of helping people is deeply rooted and driven by the ubuntu and Harambee philosophy. Recalling the old African proverb "if you want to go fast go alone. If you want to go far go together," Mukulu sought the help of his friends; Onesmus Joseph, Innocentia Mukubi, Lydia kaxuxwena and Leevi Shileka.

Additionally, Mukulu recalls that numerous challenges were endured along the way, especially under the current economic hardships, many young professionals are desirous of helping, but their economic circumstances do not allow it. While he understands this, Mukulu narrates that his biggest challenge in meeting the target of collecting 2000 Sanitary Pads was also his economic circumstances. Nonetheless, he regarded the economic challenges as sufficient motivating factors, saying "if those of us that work cannot afford Sanitary Pads, what about girls who are in school without an employed grandmother, mother, sister, or aunt because they also had to drop

out of school owing to their menstrual cycle." Additionally, he also experienced stigma as pads are considered a topic for women, many individuals that came onboard were women as they understand the situation more.

Fortunately, Mukulu persevered in leading Restore Her Dignity, finding constant motivation in the understanding that the potential of women has never been fully harnessed for economic advancement because women are stripped of their dignity for their menstrual nature. "It is our collective duty to Restore Her Dignity because everyone's dignity is tied to the dignity of women," he said. Mukulu recalls mothers crying tears of joy, young girls dancing out of excitement and the numerous smiles during the handover ceremony, noting that it made him feel fulfilled. Moreover, he believes that this initiative indirectly contributed to the high education pass rate in schools in Windhoek.

Mukulu extends his gratitude to organisations and individuals that made this initiative a success, these include; the Office of the Prime Minister, Coca-Cola Namibia, Pick n Pay, DJ Alba of House of Nalo, Tate Sammy Beer House Bar, Okafor Kitchen, and Petwa Medical Practice, 247 Fitness Gym, Dolce & Kapana, Ronaldo The Violinist, Pick 'n Pay, Barco Package Namibia, Rundu Pharmacy, PEP Store, Nails by Andina, Aurore Dawn, Windhoek Interior Vams Accountants among many others.

Furthermore, he assured that Restore Her Dignity would now strive to benefit girls in all 14 Regions of Namibia, and implores the community to support Restore Her Dignity Initiative in its future endeavours.

"You don't have to be a millionaire to assist others," says Mukulu. He aims to make this initiative an annual event and eventually divert to the boy child to panel beat both genders.

Mukulu believes that through the spirit of ubuntu, Namibia can restore a girl child's dignity.

Prime Minister launches Anti-Corruption Action Plan

The Prime Minister Dr. Saara Kuugongwelwa-Amadhila launched the National Anti-Corruption Strategy and Action Plan (NACSAP) for 2021-2025 at the first National Anti-Corruption Steering Committee meeting held in Windhoek, Namibia on 08 September 2022.

The Prime Minister of Namibia, Dr. Saara Kuugongwela-Amadhila, officially launched the National Anti-Corruption Strategy and Action Plan 2021–2025 (NACSAP) on 16 March 2022 in Windhoek.

The strategy was launched under the theme; *“Nurturing synergy in the fight against corruption for the Namibia we want,”* with the goal of fostering and promoting cooperation in the fight against corruption at all levels. According to the Prime Minister, *“Corruption can occur in all sectors therefore, we all have a responsibility to contribute to Namibia becoming a corrupt-free nation by implementing the strategy’s strategic objectives and actions.”*

The action plan is based on the country’s social and economic climate. NACSAP consists of eight strategic objectives that must be implemented by both the private and public sectors at the national, institutional, and grassroots levels. Namibia’s anti-corruption and integrity promotion efforts are centered on five strategic pillars: prevention, public education, law enforcement, deterrence, and harmonization. The aforementioned

mechanisms are expected to promote integrity, transparency, and accountability to ensure compliance and foster cross-sector synergy and effective governance.

The Prime Minister further said; *“the successful completion of the strategy formulation process and subsequent launch of this strategy demonstrates commitment as a nation to foster and promote cooperation in the quest to curb the scourge of corruption through coordinated efforts.”*

The strategy arose from a number of domestic and international instruments and treaties on the fight against corruption and money laundering to which our country has responded to through the Harambee Prosperity Plan II, which calls for the development and full implementation of the National Anti-Corruption Strategy Action Plan.

The Anti-Corruption Commission’s Director General, his team, all OMAS, all regional governors, regional councils, local authorities, traditional authorities, and all sectors were among those who contributed to the creation of NACSAP.

Namibia readies to report on the African Charter Implementation

National African Charter Implementation Committee, Cluster 4 on Management and Development of Human Resources at their first meeting at the Office of the Prime Minister, Old Cabinet Chamber on 27 October 2022.

In 2013, Namibia was one of the 26 countries that signed and ratified the African Charter on Values and Principles of Public Service and Administration in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

The African Charter is the first legally binding continental public service and administration instrument which serves to promote and improve the quality of public service delivery including fighting corruption and, generally, building a capable state for accelerated development.

The Charter serves as a roadmap for setting the standards for quality public service delivery. Its tenets provide for principles, duties of the public service, code of conduct for public service agents, rights of public service agents, management of human resources, member states' responsibilities toward service delivery as well as mechanisms for implementation of the Charter.

So far, about 38 States Parties have signed the Charter and 26 have signed and ratified the Charter. State Parties that have ratified are expected to report on the implementation of the Charter.

In lieu of the above, the African Union Commission (AUC) workshopped Namibia on the State Parties Assessment Tool (SPAT) at the SPAT Pilot Program Conference, hosted from 26 to 29 September 2022 in Swakopmund, Erongo region.

The main objective of the SPAT conference was, *inter-alia*, to assist State Parties to produce to meaningful, good quality, concise and coherent reports.

Namibia is one of the five countries that volunteered to implement the State Parties Assessment Tool (SPAT) in reporting on Charter.

This will be Namibia's first submission to the AUC since it ratified the Charter nine years ago.

Following the SPAT Conference, Namibia established a National African Charter Implementation Committee on 26 October 2022. The Committee has been mandated to facilitate the drafting and submission of the Charter Implementation Report to the AUC. Furthermore, the Implementation Committee has been divided into four clusters aligned with their mandate according to the provisions of the African Charter Chapters and Articles.

The clusters are mainly expected to compile the reports from late October to November 2022 to meet the deadline for submission. Cluster 4 on Management and Development of Human Resources met to deliberate on the issues relating to recruitment, performance management of Public Service agent, capacity development and mobility, at the Office of the Prime Minister, Old Cabinet Chamber on 27 October 2022.

Clusters are further expected to compile reports based on the SPAT Guidelines.

The Office of the Prime Minister (OPM) as the head of government administration, has been mandated to coordinate and submit the Charter Implementation Report to the African Union Commission (AUC) in December 2022.

Namibia hosts AI forum

The Namibian Government in partnership with UNESCO hosted the Southern Africa Sub-Regional Forum on Artificial Intelligence (SARFAI) in Windhoek on 7 – 9 September 2022.

The forum was held under the theme: *"towards a sustainable development-oriented and ethical use of Artificial Intelligence"* and assembled experts and high-level decision-makers from the Southern African countries.

The Prime Minister (PM), Dr Saara Kuulongelwa-Amadhila in her opening speech on 8 September 2022 said, the forum was organized to provide a mapping for the development and the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and to discuss key issues, challenges and opportunities for the application of AI in Southern Africa.

Additionally, the PM also emphasized the importance of collaboration with key stakeholders, saying; "our focus is not only on Government systems but also to enhance collaboration among stakeholders, including

the private sector, development partners and the citizen". The Premier said the Government is aware that the potential benefits of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) in particular AI, can only be realized if the current challenges around access to the Internet, technology and infrastructure shortfalls, and quality of education are urgently addressed. "In line with the Global Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), Artificial Intelligence will play a critical role in our efforts to reduce poverty, inequality, revolution our education systems, improving our healthcare systems, ensuring innovation driven development, as well as advancing gender equality and inclusion," said the PM.

The Prime Minister further explained that AI has the potential to generate new, high-value jobs in key technical specialties like cybersecurity, web development, Big Data analytics, robotics etc. that are relevant to the 4IR and job market.

Finally, the PM also highlighted that the associated AI-based green hydrogen

production technology can be a solution towards the reduction of global warming. The need for authentication and validation of the greenness of the production of green hydrogen in Namibia will require critical skills in AI and Blockchain Technology. The attained carbon credits through Blockchain Technology can be tokenized as an asset class for the Namibian economy.

Namibia in its commitment to the Paris Climate Accords and the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to reduce carbon emissions and ensure a climate resilient economy, has tapped into the idea production of green hydrogen since 2021. The project aims to produce affordable Green Hydrogen and Ammonia, whilst deploying renewable energy at scale, leading to the country's energy independence and unlocking an opportunity to industrialize Namibia by attracting energy-intensive sectors that would benefit from cheap and clean energy.

How to avoid online scamming



How to avoid online scamming

1. Before purchasing anything online, make a note of the company or seller's address, phone number, and any other contact information. Don't just use an email address.
2. Stick with reputable companies and brands, or look for positive reviews online.
3. Never give out your passwords, PIN numbers, or bank account numbers – legitimate businesses and banks will never ask you for this information via email or phone.
4. Use credit cards and secure payment services instead of debit cards when transferring money.
5. Print a copy of your order and any acknowledgement you receive.
6. Check your bank statement carefully against anything you buy online. Keep your passwords secure.
7. If you are out and about and buying online, use data provided by your network provider rather than public Wi-Fi as some hotspots may not be secure.
8. If you are selling products online, don't send off your product before receiving payment.
